Dear Friends and Supporters,

What a privilege it is to be part of the AAA community- this group from many areas in our vast land who generously assist those brothers and sisters in Christ around the Pacific and Indian Oceans who require support to improve education, health, agriculture and social wellbeing. As my family gathered on Christmas Eve, I placed an empty wooden bowl on the table, and when questioned, was able to explain the origin of the Christmas Bowl appeal. It was a gift from the Sisters in Tanzania when I lived with them in 2008, so was particularly poignant as so many in Africa struggle with drought and food insecurity. We now have endured our own tragedy of drought and bushfires, but are unlikely to suffer real famine although prices will increase and there may be temporary shortages of some items in the supermarkets. Individuals, companies and the government have responded generously, as they should, but I trust that we won't lose sight of the continuing plight of our friends overseas for whom the daily struggle to live is something most of us have never experienced or imagined.

During Advent, I followed daily readings from "Songs from a Strange Land," by Celia Kemp, suggested through the ABM website. The overall theme was a challenge to ground ourselves in God's creation and our local place, asking us to look for God around us and to listen for God's call with the question, "Would

you recognise God if he came again?" On day 33, the reflection asked us to ponder, "What is thy gift to me and do I use it to thy blessing?" A sobering question in the midst of the feverish, worldly trappings of Christmas. Amongst the discarded paper, gifts and tinsel did we ponder the gift of God's grace through the baby born in Bethlehem? And are we using that to his blessing?

In 2 Corinthians 8: 1-16, Paul spoke eloquently of generosity as God's gift to the Corinthians. By God's grace, their generosity would increase. He clearly stated that the purpose of this generosity was equality- 'a fair balance' in my NRSV translation. "The one who had much did not have too much, and the one who had little did not have too little."

"Wealth does not consist in what you have but in how you see yourself in your heart," said my Parish Priest and went on to develop the theme of outward prosperity but inward poverty and emptiness so prevalent around us.

As we move into the season of Lent so quickly after Christmas joy, encourage us Lord by your grace to see you in those near and far away even though they may look and sound different. Encourage us to give generously to enable a 'fair balance' in the distribution of the resources you have so generously provided.

WHO WILL GO FOR ME?

AAA began as a small group of dedicated people donating money to assist the work of Brothers and Sisters around the Pacific. Fr Nixon often personally knew the people AAA helped and went to visit them from time to time. Many were the fascinating stories I heard of visits to African countries, especially Ghana. My first contact with Fr Nixon was when, in answer to prayer, he asked me to visit the Sisters in Tanzania. Of course I had not exactly been praying for that, but "my heart leapt within me" when it was suggested, and I spent 14 weeks in early 2008 living with the Sisters as I visited their many houses and saw the wonderful work they did in their respective communities. As a direct result of that life-changing visit, I later spent almost 4 years teaching in a Christian School in Dodoma- a highlight of my life.

It is some time since Fr Nixon has been able to travel to visit our partners overseas and AAA has therefore relied on written reports. Sadly, most were unavailable to the new executive. Therefore, in order to comply fully with our obligations to you, our faithful and generous donors, and with the reporting necessary under government guidelines for overseas giving, it is important that AAA again send representatives to visit our partners.

This is an appeal to you, our supporters, to help us go to visit the people and projects in which AAA is currently involved. This is not to say that reporting is poorly done now, but building relationships and trust is also important. Some groups may be reluctant to ask for the true amount needed for a project, fearing rejection, when a large donation given early may enable better planning and the work to be done more quickly and efficiently. My experience tells me that recipients feel loved and energised knowing that we value them enough to visit and understand their lifestyle and needs at firsthand.

There are three possible ways to help. Firstly, pray for our overseas partners, the people and projects. Pray too for wisdom for the executive in decision making. Secondly, give money to facilitate someone to go. AAA cannot use general funds for this purpose, but if God puts it on your heart to help, please give towards air fares. Thirdly, go as I did, as our representative, paying your own way. But please be warned, only do this if you are prepared to look and listen to a different way, to love the people you meet, and for your life to be changed by God's plan.




Also poignant was the joy of the Christmas celebrations at the Paynter Home, but then to see the reality of daily life as the children help to maintain the rooms.

St Martin's Hospital, Malawi have secured a major donor and sent photographs of early work to build the X-Ray room to which AAA contributed in 2019. They



Bp Ndegwa of Kenya also sent a report of the progress of the chicken project that we supported in 2019. It is so heartening to read of such progress and to see their plans for expansion to provide food and income to assist volunteers to be able to work for them.
