Dear Friends and Supporters,

Although as secretary, I am frequently overwhelmed by the volume of correspondence and the needs expressed, there are also God given moments of joy and refreshment. In October, the recorded talks of the online quiet day conducted by the Sisters of St Mary the Virgin at Wantage, gave such encouragement. The day came not long after the observance of the Season of Creation in the Church's calendar, and in the Northern hemisphere, this is a time of year when creation begins its rest from the productivity of earlier months and enters a time of restoration and healing in preparation for new birth. Jesus often used examples from the world around him in his teaching and creation can speak to us today if we listen.

The everyday lives of Jesus's audience, and our overseas partners, are much more attuned to (and dependent on) the vagaries of weather and seasons than are our lives. Sisters in Africa, Sri Lanka and the Pacific tend gardens to grow vegetables for themselves and the poor. AAA is now funding groups in Tanzania and Thailand that are educating themselves in how to achieve better yields and improved storage so that people in villages can survive till the next wet season. We are providing goats and pigs for projects to empower villagers to provide education for their children and for priests to become less dependent on impoverished parishioners.

Water is life giving when a new well is dug, but violent in the floods of South Sudan and the typhoons experienced in the Pacific and by Sr Ines in the Philippines. Jesus used the life giving properties to convert the Samaritan woman and showed his power by calming the storm on Lake Galilee. Earth, God's Creation, nourishes and sustains us all. Our neighbours know that as their daily lives are intertwined with the earth and the seasons. Do we give sufficient thought to this in our daily lives? Do we ponder how to fulfil our part by in turn nurturing the earth?

During "Covid time" in Australia, our politicians tell us "we are all in this together", and indeed we are. These months have shown us how disconnected we have become from nature and our neighbours and yet how dependent we are on other countries and other people in our neighbourhood. Whilst living with the Sisters of St Mary in Tanzania, I experienced the isolation of not participating fully in worship as I didn't understand Kiswahili. But at the same time, I realised that I was part of the world wide Christian community, the body of Christ, which was a profound, awesome moment of understanding.

Recently, the words of the Graham Kendrick song one Sunday morning moved me to tears.

Different faces, different races, He made us one Jesus taught us how to live in harmony........

Loving one another with the love that He gives Jesus taught us how to be a family......

The Gospel message was to love the Lord our God and to love our neighbour as ourselves. Our Parish Priest challenged us by asking, "Do we really love our neighbours?" Another song tells us plainly who these neighbours are. "Neighbours are rich men and poor, neighbours are black men and white, neighbours are nearby and far away." In AAA, God continues to bring new neighbours to our attention, and show us new ways to love them. May we give generously so that through us, Jesus can "turn our (and our neighbours) sorrow into dancing".

The future may well not be what we had hoped for or planned. The quiet day reflections spoke of a need for healing of nature as well as personal and spiritual healing. The Old Testament idea of Jubilee spoke of restoration of liberty, rest for the earth and contemplation of a simpler, more just way of life. As we enter Advent, a time of preparation for Christ's coming, may we ponder afresh the magnitude of God's love for us and how we might show that to the neighbours he gives us. Stay well and safe over the Christmas Season.

Disbursement of Funds.

AAA remains committed to supporting Religious communities both small and large in many countries. Sadly, we have not yet been able to renew communication with some of these groups. At the same time, this year has brought extraordinary events requiring a rethinking of responses. Thus, we have donated directly to some Churches for food for the poor. Job losses and associated starvation have increased awareness of the need for self-sufficiency projects that will have long term, sustainable impacts, giving dignity and empowerment to clergy and villagers. Some providers have not been as fortunate as AAA and have had to withdraw promises of support. God has wonderfully made provision for AAA to be able to respond to these disparate needs through a bequest that expressed a preference for education activities.

You will also note that we have sent out support to many Communities through the Burse fund so wisely established by Fr Nixon. These funds allow Sisters and Brothers to undertake a variety of courses of a theological and practical nature.

Although most supporters donate to the general fund, others are very specific in directing their contribution. AAA is obliged to honour these expressed wishes and gladly does so.


More Self Sufficiency in Rwanda.

In the August edition, AAA supported two projects in Rwanda, both aimed at increasing self sufficiency and empowering women and families. Fr Chadrack's community completed the building for storing and selling the beans and sent another project which aims to empower clergy. After some modification in line with AAA suggestions, the project is now to provide 38 clergy families with 2 goats each. It has been a longheld dream for Fr Chadrack from when he was a student at Scott Christian University in Kenya. There can be a perception that clergy families don't face economic hardship as others do, yet as the son of a Pastor, he knew that was not true. Giving clergy families a means to generate income will give them more dignity and decrease their dependence on the poorest of their parishioners.

Empowering an Indian Student

"Greetings! I am Sam Sunny Anand S., an ordained priest from the Church of South India (CSI), Diocese of Madras. Currently, I am doing my Masters study in the field of Ecumenical Studies at the University of Bonn, Germany (M.A. in Ecumenical Studies). I have worked as a priest and an ecumenical worker in India since 2013. My major work was concentrated in rural parts of South India around Chennai (Madras) among underprivileged sections of the society. After completion of my studies, I will go back to India to continue my ordained ministry to serve the needy and deserving." This was the start of an unusual email received in October. Sam Sunny used his own savings to move to Germany in 2019 and is now in the second year of his studies. However, because of Corona he was unable to work and support his wife and young daughter. After

diligent checking and consultation, AAA decided to fund the less than half of his needs that he had requested. Many of us have seen or heard of the dire straits of overseas students stranded here in Australia without support in the past 6 months. Sam Sunny's thanks were profuse and we look forward to hearing of his success and return to Chennai in 2021 to again work in his community.

This wonderful story of the initiative, persistence and self-sacrificing hard work of Grandmother Edith Nokwanda Khanyile from an Informal Settlement of more than 10,000 people in KwaZulu Natal, came via the Oratory of the Good Shepherd. Although unemployed, she survives on sewing and serves as a Pastor in her Church. Seeing the need, she started a soup kitchen to feed the hungry children and elderly in the community and now provides a hot meal of soup and bread 3 times a week. Before Covid19, she accessed left over food from supermarkets and used donations from friends to help. These sources are no longer available. Brothers from the Oratory of the Good Shepherd have visited her and offered some help. AAA sent a contribution towards the annual cost of food, replacement gas bottles and utensils. Matthew 25:35- "For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink...." And 40-"Truly, I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of those who are members of my family, you did it to me."

Thank you for partnering with us to reach out to India' poorest and most suffering at this most difficult times. May God bless you richly.







A brief note from the **Community of the Sacred Name in Fiji.** "Jotikaa graduated with BA in Commerce. Thank you for all your help in her education."

Sister Isabella from Madagascar wrote after we sent money for well repairs. "The Lord will be with you and your family and all the members of AAA. We all are fine now! And we repeat many thanks to you of the money which you sent for us. Yes we want to rebuilt the house of well but we think very deep because we must have

another well. When we called the engineer to look at it! And it is very expensive! So we wait in this month and dig a new well and we use the money which you sent! And to make a gutter to collect the water from the rain! When the rain comes! And use the water to wash etc. Send our love and our thanks to all the members of AAA .The weather in Madagascar is warm so the coronavirus is moving now! With much love and prayers....."

Bp Alphonse Vascanit Ndutiye wrote from ACC Yaounde Nsimalen of illness and the need for completing the clinic. He sent a photo of the compound wall needing completion.

Joyful excitement came from **Sr Miriam** at the orphanages in South Africa after our gift and suggestion that it be put towards a food garden and chicken project.

Sister Merina Dube of the Sisters of the Transfiguration in Zimbabwe wrote with pictures of their water supply and brick making for work on a new house they are slowly building as accommodation for new Sisters. "In our country we make farm bricks if we want to build small building. It's cheaper, but when the building is big we buy stronger bricks. The hole in the corner was dug so as to create a place to mix mud and water for moulding bricks. The youths moulding bricks are about to finish moulding bricks. The



water problem - we have 3 boreholes one at the secondary act, hospital and primary school. The sisters' Convent is connected to the hospital borehole and secondary school, but when there is no electricity to pump water we normally have problems. As for bricks, we get water from a distance that is at our primary school borehole whereby we ended by hiring someone to fetch water for the project. In normal circumstances, if we delay to receive rain all boreholes remain with little water which we use carefully up to the rain season. We hope you are all well and safe. As for us, we very fine and keeping indoors when we have no business outside.

AAA was able to respond when **Fr Damien Trudeau** from the ACC Missionary Diocese of the West in South Africa, wrote seeking support for an Eye Clinic to be run by Dr Keith Reid and the Reach4Sight foundation. The 3 day workshop is scheduled to take place at Khuma Township in November, but Covid may change those plans. The clinic would see approximately 240 people and provide up to 150 pairs of glasses.


Remembering that we are all completely dependent on God's loving mercy, please pray for:
